Dear Friends:

Since 1965, the Nebraska United Methodist Foundation has been supporting United Methodist churches, ministries, and people within this great state of Nebraska. As we look to the future, and many more years of service to you, we remain not only a secure place for all Methodists, either currently or formerly associated with the Conference, to invest, but also a place to facilitate a legacy for camps, local churches, and other ministries.

Many scholarships and grants are disbursed annually through the Foundation and are supported by pastors, churches, and donors. The Foundation assists clergy by granting seminary scholarships to attend seminary, supports new church starts, and provides ministry grants that enable outreach and increase missions to Nebraska churches. In 2021, the Foundation provided over \$30,000 to twenty seminary students. Over \$7,000 was awarded to local pastors for course of study scholarships. Nearly \$100,000 was awarded through 40 ministry grants and \$60,000 was awarded to support new church start-ups.

The Foundation continues to provide many investment services as well as legacy giving opportunities for churches, clergy and laity:

- The creation and development of endowment funds
- Presentations of Foundation investment services
- Gift and estate seminars for church groups
- Fund development workshops
- Planned gift visits with individuals
- Stewardship and generosity presentations



Dr. Dean and Mrs. Keitha Thomson Pioneer Mission Grant Program at NUMF

Dr. Dean and Mrs. Keitha Thomson of Nebraska City have enjoyed mission trips for many years. A friend of theirs served nine years in Pakistan and was a source of encouragement for them to enter the mission field. "We were both raised in the church and felt compelled to be involved in helping others," says Dr. Thomson. "There was a time in our lives when we were asking ourselves if we were following God's will, and as we prayed about what we were doing and where God wanted us, the option of serving as missionaries surfaced again."

After serving a year in India with the Methodist Church Board of Global Missions, they returned to the Nebraska City area and continued their work through short term trips to Jamaica. This work, and these trips, culminated many years of memories, friendships and stories about how God was working through them.

"It's amazing how God works," Mrs. Thomson reflects. "On one particular trip, an elderly man from the community asked to join our team to Jamaica only two weeks from departure. He had health challenges and there was a concern about his ability to handle the environment. We also didn't have a ticket or bed for him."

Having faith that things would work out, the Thomsons told him that if he could obtain a ticket, they would find him a bed. They questioned whether he would be able to find a ticket at a reasonable price. Days later, he found a ticket cheaper than what the group paid and despite health challenges, he was determined to make the trip.

"We learned of his expertise and enthusiasm for computers," Dr. Thomson recalls. "Because of his presence, while we were in Jamaica, our agenda began to change. By the time we left, we had built a computer lab at the local school, which was not in our plans at all. But it was in God's plans." These are the stories that kept the Thomsons involved in mission work for over 25 years, recruiting church members and volunteers from their community, and many from other states, yearning to have others feel God's presence and be a part of His work.

"One of the best compliments we received from the Jamaican people was that they had never met a white Christian before," recalls Dr. Thomson.

On one trip, their team was building a small home for an elderly lady in a neighboring village. A local person stopped by and asked a team member, who happened to be a minister, who they were and why they were building this house. After visiting with him, he asked if we were Christians, and then asked how he could become a Christian. Needless to say, on that particular day, much more was being built than the single house they were working on.

After countless experiences of seeing God's work on these trips, changing the lives of the local people they were helping, as well as of the missionaries that they were working side by side with, the Thomsons heard the calling to do more. This is when they called the Nebraska United Methodist Foundation to see if they could help.

"I was thrilled to receive the call and hear that they had an interest in creating financial support for mission work for local churches and other community entities," says Jackie Urkoski, Executive Director. The Thomsons are pioneering a brand new grant program at NUMF with the first of its kind mission grant. The Dean and Keitha Thomson Mission Grant will provide support in a much needed area. "We have received phone calls for years asking if we have mission grants available, and now we can finally say yes."

"We want people to have this experience. It is life changing. It brings people closer to God. They bring that experience back home and share it with others by their witness," says Mrs. Thomson. "Many times it's finances that prevent people from considering mission service, so we would like to remove that barrier, plus provide an incentive. Retired persons are often on fixed incomes. Young people are spending their money on tuition and just getting started with their lives. Both may want to serve but have a problem justifying the expense, or just don't have the money in the first place. We have a gift vehicle through NUMF that may help ease some of that burden," says Dr. Thomson.


When the Thomsons were asked why they chose NUMF to work with they responded, "We trust the NUMF. It's comforting to work with people you know."

Churches Band Together to Serve a Community with a Trade School

Inspiration called as the Brownville congregation looked to help those outside of their small town. An hour and a half north, Omaha had a community in need. Students tried to go to college to get an education to help their families, but they could not make it through the program. What would be next for them? With the financial assistance of a ministry grant from the Foundation and the vision of Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso's, a trade school has emerged.

Brownville UMC said it best: "The roots of helping the oppressed and giving them new opportunities in life go deep for the Brownville UMC. They go back prior to the Civil War, when the people of Brownville aided former African slaves crossing the state border from Missouri, which was a slave state prior to the Civil War." The church is doing that again in helping Iglesia Comunitaria to provide training for students as HVAC technicians and electricians.


The Mid-America Lumberman's Association, the Northwestern Lumberman's Association, the Iglesia Comunitaria, and the Brownville UMC have teamed up to offer this trade school opportunity in South Omaha at Omaha Grace UMC. The trade school will graduate six

students this spring, who made the sacrifice of their time to participate in this program.

"Basically, these peoples' lives are going to change; it's that important. For them we are providing them with a life opportunity – after they finish this program, they will get a well-paying job and security that they do not have at this very moment. Their families are proud of them and know that they are going to improve the finances for the family and that they will save money for things, like insurance, that they have not been able to afford in the past." Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso said.

Iglesia Comunitaria's faith statement is: We're here to serve God by serving the neighbors. "The Foundation is helping us to achieve our faith statement. The main goal is to be able to lead this community and to be used by God to change people's lives in this neighborhood. Every person in this program is from outside the church, which is exactly what we want." Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso said.

Student Ramon Miramontes expressed his excitement for the program. "We are the initial class of this new program. We are getting the best of both worlds in studying electricity, wiring, and HVAC. It's free and a good way to get our feet



wet. I would recommend this program, especially for people who don't think they have the time or money."

"Our trainer, Mike, is a good teacher, and he is patient with us," another student Daniel Rodriguez said. Daniel plans to join the union and said that he is not going to give up.

Pastor Juan praises the students and congratulates each one of them for participating in the program. Without the students, there would not be a program to offer. "It doesn't work if they don't take it."

"And without the Foundation, we wouldn't be able to build this program. NUMF becomes our partner." Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso said.

"I did not know much about the Foundation prior to receiving a Course of Study Scholarship. It is important for others to know that the Foundation can provide more support than just to seminary students." Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso said. A church can have an idea and can run with it, should they choose, by applying for one of the many grants that the Foundation offers. Pastor Juan Carlos Veloso would recommend putting the idea on paper, and then talking to the Foundation as they can help a church to make the idea a reality.

The Brownville UMC congregation will continue to help these students after graduation. It has raised money to get the graduates gift cards so they can buy their tools and tool belt to begin their successful careers.

Juan Carlos Veloso wants every church to know that this is going on in South Omaha and it can happen in your church, too.

Mary Alice

For many people who love music, it entails singing along to your favorite song in the car, attending the occasional musical, or having it play in the background while you work. But for the late Mary Alice Park, it was different. “Music was ingrained into her soul from childhood on,” husband Loyal says. “Music contributed to who she was as a person.”

Mary Alice was born in Hastings, Nebraska in 1935. Having spent part of her childhood relocating to Orange County, California with her family, they eventually made their way back to Arapahoe, Nebraska. Her parents loved music and wanted to give Mary Alice the chance to learn how to play an instrument. They started her with the violin. “Someone, somewhere in the family, had an old violin, so this is why Mary Alice started with violin lessons,” Loyal recalls. “There was a woman up the road in Cambridge who studied music in Europe before moving back to the area. Mary Alice learned almost everything she knew about music at that point from her.”



Upon graduating from Arapahoe High School as Valedictorian, Mary Alice attended Hastings College where she majored in both music and elementary education. Soon after, she took a teaching job at Meadow Lane Elementary School in Lincoln, Nebraska. Her gift in music led her to perform with the Lincoln Symphony Orchestra, as well as at many weddings and church services. It was during this time that she met Loyal. He was just returning from two years of service and he didn't have a lot of acquaintances in Lincoln. “A good friend of mine suggested I call Mary Alice. Our first date was July 3, 1958 and we went to the movie, No Time for Sergeants,” Loyal chuckles. “Luckily she had time for me. She was a busy woman. Sometimes our dates consisted of me helping her grade papers in her apartment.”

Four months later, Loyal knew she was the one. In November 1958, he proposed to her. “I didn't know if she was going to say yes, and when she did, I was so happy and relieved!” Loyal recalls. They were married in June 1959 and had two children, Rosann and Devon. Mary Alice's love for music reflects in both of their lives today. Devon is a professional musician in Colorado, performing with the Greeley Philharmonic Orchestra, Boulder Chamber Orchestra and Opera Colorado. As a child, Rosann learned to play the piano and violin, playing on the same violin Mary Alice used in her younger years. That same violin is being played by one of Rosann's three daughters, triplets, all of whom are involved in music, playing the violin, viola and cello, one doing so internationally.

“Mary Alice had an impact wherever she went; this is evident through the success and happiness of our children and grandchildren and their

love for music, but it was also evident within our church,” Loyal says. Long-time members of the Aldersgate United Methodist Church in Lincoln, Mary Alice was the one who named the church. “Mary Alice played at our church services every few months and it was beautiful,” Loyal says. “Everyone loved it.”

Mary Alice's love for music is what inspired Loyal to create an endowment fund at NUMF to remember and honor Mary Alice's life. The endowment fund, called the Mary Alice Park Endowment Fund, was created as a gift from her estate, and will work to support the music ministry at Aldersgate UMC, specifically bringing in string quartets and soloists from time to time.

“Music was so important to Mary Alice, and in ways, shaped our family and our lives. It only seems fitting that this should be part of Mary Alice's legacy,” Loyal says. “She played an important role in the early days of Aldersgate UMC and now her life will continue to play a role in the church for many years to come.”




