TO OUR PARTNERS



If there has ever been a year that reminds us of the power of nature and the power of connectedness, this is it. Just a year ago, in the spring of 2019, flood waters ravaged a good part of Nebraska's landscape, destroying roads and bridges and homes and businesses, resulting in death and loss of farmland and property, and leaving a mess that would take months, or years, to clean up. And from that devastation, good Nebraskans everywhere pitched in to help, with donations of time, effort, dollars, food, hay, cleaning supplies, and so much more. Connectedness at its best, living out the recognition that what affects one of us affects all of us. Members of communities, members of churches, members of families, came together to help, to help in the short term and for the long haul. The Nebraska United Methodist Foundation was glad to be part of that effort, providing \$30,000 to support the Conference's flood relief efforts. (And in a sneak preview to the 2020 report, the Foundation also provided nearly \$40,000 in grants to local churches in response to the global coronavirus pandemic.)

Strengthening the connections among and between Nebraska United Methodists is at the heart of what the Foundation does. In 2019, as in other years, the Foundation provided scholarships for 12 students pursuing

a career in ministry. The Foundation provided congregational development grants to new church starts. The Foundation provided ministry grants to support new or developing ministries to nearly 30 churches in the state. The Lunch and Learn program was created, providing clergy opportunities to learn more deeply in the area of stewardship. And the investment and management services provide expertise and stability to Nebraska United Methodist Churches to support their own stewardship efforts, enabling them to grow in ministry. All of this is possible because of generous donors to the Foundation; thank you.

It's been a year of staff changes at the Foundation, too. In July, the board named Jackie Urkoski to be Executive Director of the Foundation, and in September, the Rev. Dr. F. Matt Fowler joined the staff as Director of Stewardship. Christy Bousquet became the Administrative Assistant for the Foundation, and Marci Logsdon rounds out the staff as the Director of Finance. Together, they bring mission, commitment, and amazing gifts in service to Nebraska churches, pastors, and laity....and to the Foundation's role in being a partner in ministry with you.

The many scholarships and grants that are disbursed every year from the Foundation are used to come alongside pastors and churches across Nebraska to help in many areas of ministry.


We have assisted clergy in attending Seminary, supported churches in new starts, and provided ministry grants to

CENTRAL CITY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH ANTICIPATED AND PREPARED FOR A RAINY DAY



Is your church anticipating and prepared for your rainy day?

The Foundation is here to help you prepare for the rain. Contact the Foundation for more information on how we can support you in this way.

Quite often, many churches simply think: as long as we don't have to use our whole snow removal budget, we should be able to make it. The fear of a "rainy day" is always there, but sometimes that fear is not enough to drive a church into action. Central City United Methodist Church is not one of those churches. They anticipated the "rain" and prepared for it.

Central City UMC opened a fund at the Foundation and slowly grew it over time, knowing it would serve its purpose when the time was right, or if "rain" came. And then the rain came in the spring and summer of 2019. There was no insurance claim to help offset the more than \$100,000 in expenses the church suffered in roof damages. However, there was no panic at the church. The preparation for this day had been made and the solution

was already in place. They simply contacted the Foundation to request a withdrawal from their "rainy day" fund that the Foundation so carefully managed all these years.

Central City UMC was able to cover 85% of their costs with its Foundation account. Their rainy day preparation allowed them to meet their budget, and continue their ministry work through UMCOR and their food pantry. They were even able to provide flood relief assistance. Rev. Tom Lucas shared, "We thank the previous generation for their generosity. They helped us through thoughtful and careful planning, and gifts came to us through their retirement funds and wills. We are looking to the current members to do the same for the next generation."

FOUNDATION INTRODUCES NEW LOCAL PASTOR SCHOLARSHIP

The number of Local Pastors serving our churches has seen a dramatic increase. A Local Pastor is a full-time or part-time pastor of a church who is pursuing his or her education, while caring for a congregation. This individual becomes licensed and educated through the Course of Study, a year-round experiential and classroom learning process sometimes requiring the individual to stay on campus for a two-week period. Most of the time, Local Pastors are responsible for all of the educational and travel costs with little financial assistance. Rev. Joe Krepel, Associate Pastor in Columbus, shares, "There are not only class costs, but books, travel, and hotel for two weeks on-site."

Rev. Jenice Epp, Local Pastor of Bassett and Springview United

Methodist Churches states, "My two churches are very supportive in spirit, but neither has the money to help with my Course of Study classes."

The Foundation has recognized the need for Local Pastor Scholarships and turned to endowment funds to support this treasured group of pastors. The Frederick and Esther Paulus Local Pastor Scholarship and the Foundation's Gifts from the Heart Pastoral Education and Support Endowment are both being put to work to help Local Pastors. Our goal is to continue to build these Local Pastor Scholarships. GIFTS FROM THE HEART

“Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can.” This well-known quote from John Wesley is celebrated around the world as a cornerstone of Methodist stewardship. Another lesser known line quoted from Wesley is, “I look upon the whole world as my parish.” These two quotes sum up the Foundation’s Gifts From The Heart Program (GFTH).

GFTH is a set of endowment funds created by the Foundation in 2001. As then Executive Director, Jim Heller, thought about the work the Foundation could and should be doing, he asked the questions, “What kind of ministries could we hang our hat on? How can the Foundation make a difference?” And GFTH was born.

GFTH allows United Methodists to join together in a stewardship effort. It gives individual gifts the opportunity to come together and create a great impact on Nebraska United Methodist churches and beyond. “It is an opportunity for people to join efforts, to unite, in order to sustain and grow ministries that are important to them,” explains current Executive Director, Jackie Urkoski. The five established endowment funds of GFTH focus on supporting the following areas: Pastoral Education and Support, Youth and Camping, New Church Starts, Greatest

Needs, and Mission Work.

Because endowment funds preserve the principal of the fund and only distribute the income, GFTH works to have a reach in perpetuity, and in a way that is far more impactful than any one gift alone. Through the years, GFTH has distributed more than \$1 million to impact Nebraska and other areas. It is responsible for establishing the Foundation’s annual ministry grant program, which has distributed over \$300,000 to nearly 90 churches since 2015.

GFTH is also behind the Foundation’s ability to give New Start/New Faith Community Grants to support our state’s youngest churches and congregations. In an effort to meet a current and growing need, the Foundation has recently established a new program of support: The Local Pastor Scholarship. This effort works to support a group of people within our state who are hearing God’s call and pastoring a church, while typically working another job to support their remote seminary education.

GFTH addresses urgent needs as well, both locally and beyond, from the Greatest Needs and Mission Funds. Over the years, GFTH has supported both hurricane relief and tornado recovery efforts in other states. As recent as 2019, \$30,000 was disbursed to support flood relief efforts within our own Conference.

Jim Heller had a vision that GFTH would be available to churches to support ongoing needs, as well as during times of great and unusual need, and GFTH does just that. The Five Hearts Society was established to recognize donors who pledged to make gifts of \$5,000 or more to the Gifts From The Heart Fund. Such gifts may be stretched out over a period of up to five consecutive years and may be split among the five funds however the donor wishes.

Donors who wish to establish a named fund within the Gifts From The Heart Fund can do so with a gift of \$25,000 or more. The Foundation has been blessed to receive gifts in excess of \$100,000 to the Gifts From The Heart ministry and we encourage persons who would like to learn more about the GFTH Fund and the Five Hearts Society to contact the Foundation for further information. Any gift, large or small, unites with the efforts of other United Methodists to create a lasting impact on churches and ministries around you.

As Jim reflects on the growth of GFTH over the years, he offers this, “If you want to raise and harvest a crop, you first need to plant the seeds.” Thank you to all current and past contributors to this effort. We are united in our efforts and vision to sustain and grow Nebraska churches and ministries.

FOUNDATION AND UNITED METHODIST MEN CELEBRATE OVER 20 YEARS IN PARTNERSHIP

The Nebraska United Methodist Foundation and United Methodist Men (UMM) have partnered for over 20 years, and the impact made together is cause for celebration.

“The resources and work of the Nebraska United Methodist Foundation have made a big difference for the mission and ministry of United Methodist Men,” says Randy Fleming, long-time leader of the ministry. The UMM is celebrating 31 years of ministry that encourages men and women to enter full-time Christian service, partially through the development of seminary scholarships. These scholarships are supported through their 1,000 Club, an opportunity that encourages people to give \$100 per year for 10 years.

To date, the Club has over 100 members, with four families donating \$10,000 or more to establish their own named scholarship funds. In 2016, UMM started the John Wesley Pillar Fund with the help of a ministry grant from the Foundation. This Fund will eventually enable UMM to hire an Executive Director for the organization.

The Foundation holds and invests these funds for UMM. Randy Fleming shares, “The Foundation gives us a peace of mind. We trust them. Brokerage companies come and go but I don’t have to worry about that with the Foundation. They are a fiduciary responsible partner with great returns and socially responsible investing that align with our beliefs. That makes me and the UMM donors feel good.”

In addition to being an investment partner, the Foundation also sponsors the UMM Dinner and Auction, held annually during the week of Annual Conference. “The Foundation is our longest active annual sponsor of our biggest event. The Foundation sees the big picture. All of the gains from work they do go back into Nebraska churches and ministries, and that is a good thing to be a part of,” Randy continues. “When you invest with the Foundation, you invest in every church and ministry in Nebraska.”

Mid-March brought what is known as the Great Flood of 2019. To help fund the needs within the state, the Nebraska United Methodist Foundation gave \$30,000 for Conference use to aid in flood relief efforts in Nebraska. This assistance helped to support the many teams of people assigned to some of Nebraska's hardest hit areas. These Nebraska Disaster Recovery Teams worked in 20 counties with an estimated 25,000 volunteer hours. The Foundation is grateful for the ability to use the Gifts From The Heart Missions Fund to help in times of need such as this.

THE SPIRIT OF CHRISTMAS PROJECT

The Spirit of Christmas Project began in 2016 as a way for the Foundation to give back. Each year during the Christmas season, the Foundation chooses two ministries to receive surprise donations from the Foundation's Gifts From the Heart Endowment Fund. It is a way for the Foundation to pay forward the generosity it often feels from individuals making unexpected gifts to the Foundation.

Christmas is a special time of the year for giving, and the Foundation wanted to be a part of that. It's yet another way for us to spread God's love, and share the blessings that have been bestowed upon the Foundation.

In 2019, the recipients of the two \$1,000 awards were Nebraska Wesleyan University's Suicide Prevention Program and the United Campus Ministry at University of Nebraska - Kearney.

THE FOUNDATION: A TOOL FOR CHURCHES

Pastor Dennis Wheeler recalls a time in his childhood, on a quiet summer day, where his grandfather said to him, "You are coming with me today." Away they went to his grandfather's shop where he began learning about woodworking. Connecting individual pieces of wood with the right tools to create something new planted a seed in young Denny. Today, Pastor Denny continues to apply this concept his grandfather taught him so many years ago, but now to a greater cause.

He now uses the right tools to build healthy congregations, and individuals, in the best way he knows how through the hand of God. In reflecting on the Foundation's work, Pastor Denny says, "The Foundation is a tool of the Church. You reinvest back in us. You create a shared gift and I love that. You do such a great job."

Pastor Denny has a three-point charge. Each of the three churches

holds an investment account with the Foundation and each is a ministry grant recipient. Ministry grants are available every fall to each United Methodist church in Nebraska. "Fremont Calvary received a grant to update the sound system for the music ministry. It works well with hearing aids," Pastor Denny explains. After one woman heard clearly in church for the first time in a long time, she exclaimed, "I'm young again! I can hear."



"This is the gift I see. The Foundation brings back life to a church," Pastor Denny continues, "Your grant changes things. It's a gift that changes people."

Schuyler UMC used the grant to put on an arts camp during the summer. This camp allows kids of all faiths to come together and produce a play about a scripture passage. It allows the kids and people of the community to come together in a unique way, despite

their beliefs. Pastor Denny says, "Our message to them is that they are all a creation of God. We challenge them to see that everyone has value, everyone is unique. We say to them: use your gift."

Pastor Denny says this challenge and message also comes from the Foundation through the Ministry Grant program, a program which allows each church to apply for a grant and to use it in a way that is unique to that church's ministry. In reflecting on the Foundation, Pastor Denny says this of the Foundation's services, "You provide for us in a unique way, you challenge us to listen to God. We have to pray and listen. You teach us to invest in the church and you make the church the partner. The Foundation is such a powerful tool."


FOUNDATION HOSTED FAITH AND FINANCES WORKSHOP AT BROKEN BOW UMC




